Ah-Tah-Thi-Ki Museum Seminole Tribe of Florida

Philanthropic Bill of Rights

Philanthropy is based on voluntary action for the common good. It is a tradition of giving and sharing that is primary to the quality of life. To assure that philanthropy merits the respect and trust of all potential donors and sponsors, and that all donors, sponsors, prospective donors and prospective sponsors can have full confidence in the Ah-Tah-Thi-Ki Museum ("Museum"), and in causes they are asked to support, the Museum declares that all donors and sponsors have these rights:

- I. To be informed of the Museum's mission, of the way the Museum intends to use donated resources, and of the Museum's capacity to use donations effectively for their intended purposes.
- II. To be informed of the identity of those serving on the Tribal Council of the Seminole Tribe of Florida, and to expect the Tribal Council of the Seminole of Tribe of Florida to exercise prudent judgment in its stewardship responsibilities.
- III. To be assured their gifts will be used for the purposes for which they were given.
- IV. To receive appropriate acknowledgement and recognition.
- V. To be assured that information about their donation or sponsorship is handled with respect and with confidentiality.
- VI. To expect that all relationships with individuals representing the Museum's interests to the donor or sponsor will be professional in nature.
- VII. To be informed regarding whether those seeking donations or sponsorships are volunteers, employees of the Museum or hired solicitors.
- VIII. To have the opportunity for their names to be deleted from mailing lists that the Museum may intend to share.
 - IX. To feel free to ask questions when making a donation or sponsorship, and to receive prompt, truthful and forthright answers.
